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The Ultimate Local Dive Site?

This \$2 million backyard creation is not the kiddie pool of your childhood

Animal Planet has broadcast TV shows beloved by divers and nature lovers - including *Blue Planet*, The Crocodile Hunter and Whale Wars - but it's produced some wacky shows too (we're looking at you, Mud Lovin' Rednecks). The Pool Master might not be as far-fetched as some other shows run by the network — the series showcases backyards transformed by pool designer Anthony Archer-Wills - but a 140-foot-long pool in Springville, Utah, featured on one episode definitely qualifies as over the top.

The 360,000-gallon pool cost \$2 million to build and

is a water lover's playground, with a 60-foot water slide hidden inside a massive man-made mountain, five waterfalls, and a 300-footlong lazy river. And that's not all: You can put on dive gear (the owners are certified),

splash into a 54-foot-long,

26-foot-deep tunnel built inside the mountain, and fin your way to the main pool. As we went to press, there were no underwater attractions installed (what, no replica of the *Titanic*?), but something tells us this family isn't finished yet.

Fancy your own backyard dive site? All you need, according to Animal Planet's website, is "a suitable-size plot of land for the project, a sufficient budget already tucked away, and some out-of-this-world ideas."

The iPad Aquatic

Divers can now map reefs, consult field guides and compile fish surveys – all without breaking the surface

Feel naked without your iPad? Never fear: It can come along on your next dive with a new housing by iDive, which inflates a thin, flexible bubble over your iPad screen. Brave inventor Michael Berumen, a marine sciences professor, first tested the idea with a Ziploc in his bathtub. With the help of Watershot Inc., he added a sturdy frame that stands up to extreme pressure, and a system to bleed air on ascents. Plugged into a CO_2 cartridge, the device can tag along with advanced divers to 130 feet.

Even in the shallows, the housing is a game-changer: ReefID is working on an app that draws on facial-recognition technology, so any diver or snorkeler can help scientists catalog marine life.

But don't plan on checking Facebook on your safety stop just yet – there are (thankfully) some places cell and Wi-Fi signals still can't reach. idivehousing.com
